For more than a year our board has been working to build a larger online presence so members can connect, collaborate and share experiences throughout the month. The first step was SAGS Support, our members-only

website. Here you see a view of the site as it looks when you access it on a tablet (an iPad mini in this example). Our new sites are built on the WordPress web platform so that members can view them on both computers and mobile devices. In this iPad example, you'll notice two icons in the bar just above the image. Tap the three-line icon on the left to display the site menu or tap the magnifying glass icon to display the search bar. Swipe up or down to view the content on this page.

Disaster Preparedness

Research Toolbox

I find it interesting that May Day – the first day of May – is traditionally the day that cultural institutions and archives set aside to review and adjust their disaster plans. Here in Florida, May is the time we review our personal disaster plans and prepare for hurricane season which begins the first of June.

In addition to checking disaster supplies (batteries, non-perishable food, water, etc.) you can also use May to review your digital disaster plan. Here are some of the things to review:

- **Data backups.** I use my computer's automatic backup feature, but this is a good time to make sure any new data folders or other content are also included.
- **Blog backups.** WordPress users can use its export feature and download a complete copy of your site at any time. If something happens to your website, that backup file can be imported quickly and easily.
- Image backups. A Flickr Pro account (\$50/year) includes auto-uploading all new images from your desktop and mobile devices. It makes an easy off-site backup for photos, scanned images and even video. Amazon Prime members get free access to Prime Photos as part of their package. Google users get 15GB of storage for free which can be used for photos and docs.
- Security check. I use 1Password to manage passwords and other personal data. It includes a security audit to remind me it's time to update old passwords. The new Watchtower feature identifies the sites that have known vulnerabilities so I can change the passwords at those sites.

• **Power check.** We use surge protectors and uninterrupted power supply (UPS) devices to protect all our electronics. Now's a good time to check them and replace older ones no longer operating at full capacity.

Hurricane season isn't our only concern. There are plenty of disasters just waiting to destroy our research and historical documents. Make May your month to review your own disaster plan and insure your archives are also protected.

If your search returns a large number of datasets, they won't all fit on one screen. In this case click on the **Older Posts** link at the bottom of the screen to see more. The **Newer Posts** link will take you back to the previous page.

In the obituaries example above, the content is in a standard text format. However, most of the datasets - cemeteries, church records, etc. - are in table format. Some of those tables are quite large. It is possible to view them on a tablet or phone, but in most cases using your desktop computer provides the best viewing option. The search box will tell you which datasets contain the names you are searching, but it won't find the actual record. Once you've opened a dataset, use the Find On Page command (CTRL/f for Windows - CMD/f for Mac) to search the page.

This example is the Safari browser for Mac. Your computer/browser may look a bit different but the basics are the same. In this example, after pressing CMD/f the browser displays a search box in the top right corner. This is where I enter the name/phrase I'm searching then press the Return key. The browser moves the screen to and highlights the first instance of my search. The search box shows me this is the only instance on this dataset. If there are multiple instances, clicking the arrow buttons next to the search box lets me move to the next or previous find. The Done key ends the search.

Some of the data tables are quite large. When viewing a large table, you'll notice that the sidebar has been turned off. Use the menus at the top of the page or your browser's back button to navigate these pages. You will also notice

that the comment box has been turned off on these data pages. If you have a question or a comment about a specific table, use the Discussions topic on the site's Cafe page.

The datasets currently posted at SAGS Support are just the beginning. We will be adding more records throughout the summer. New additions will be announced in the weekly Research Notes newsletter.

Articles will be edited for grammar and style and any edits will be reviewed with the author prior to publication.
